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From the Pastor

"I keep asking that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the glorious Father, may give you the Spirit of wisdom and revelation so that you may know him better." Ephesians 1:17

Lent is a season of preparation. Just as the world was flooded for 40 days during Noah's time to prepare the land, just as there were 40 years of wandering in the desert before the Israelites entered the promised land, just as Jesus spent 40 days tempted in the wilderness, we spend 40 days from Ash Wednesday to Easter (excluding Sundays) to prepare ourselves for God.

For a long time, I have mused about COVID-19 as a time of preparation. During COVID-19, much of the busyness which previously filled our lives is not currently possible. With countless limitations on our regular activities, what is left? Beyond the ways you may have been participating in the St. Matthew's community through phone calls, services, Soup's On, Bible studies, and more... what we have left is a time where we might get ready and prepare ourselves for a time to come.

Traditionally over Lent people have fasted and prayed. The tradition of making pancakes on Shrove Tuesday came from the need to use up the eggs, sugar, and butter in the pantry before Lent. I would encourage you to think about how you are preparing yourself for God. Fasting is good because it teaches us to depend on and trust in God, but I would especially encourage a **commitment to prayer**.

Prayer is powerful. God works through prayer all of the time, but prayer also has the power to work on us too: preparing us and those around us. During Lent, we will be going through a sermon series on the Lord's Prayer and we will also host a short GIFT group about prayer. I would encourage you to join and to keep praying. Take dedicated time to pray, but also find those few seconds or minutes to pray before you start anything or after you end a task. Invite God into your life and work and watch Him show up for you.

I know prayer can be intimidating. What do I say? What do I do? It doesn't need to be complicated. Think about it like a conversation with God. Spend time speaking, asking Him questions, thanking Him, saying sorry, and recognizing the glory of who He is, but also take time to listen. He will speak if we are willing and take the time to really hear what He is saying to us.

As you have these conversations keep asking for guidance. Ask God to show you people in your life who need prayers or who may need a call. Ask God to work on the hearts of people you know so that they may accept Jesus. I encourage you to be open to His urging if He needs you to speak to one of them. Ask God where your next point of growth will be. Ask God how you might use the gifts He has given you to work for His Kingdom. We just finished a sermon study on the Church during which we explored our role as the workers of God's Kingdom. We are called, as a church, to be a people who prepare ourselves and others to receive God's Kingdom of love, peace, and justice. Just remember, the more prepared we are, the more able we are to receive.


As a child, I had a hard time understanding God's presence with me during prayer, so what I used to do was place a chair beside my bed. Then as I sat up or laid down, I would imagine and eventually know that God was there. I would have conversations (often very one-sided) but every so often when He knew I needed something He would speak or lead me. This is not beyond anyone. Just like every relationship, it takes diligence and openness. Let us take this time to prepare ourselves and others for God's Kingdom through prayer as we say together, "Thy Kingdom Come."

"I pray that the eyes of your heart may be enlightened in order that you may know the hope to which he has called you, the riches of his glorious inheritance in his holy people and his incomparably great power for us who believe." Ephesians 1:18-19

I pray that this might be a blessed, life-giving, and fruitful time of preparation for you all.

The 2020 COVID-19 'winter of our discontent' threatened to establish a climate of despair like that in C.S. Lewis's 'The Lion the Witch and the Wardrobe' where "it was always winter and never Christmas." The concerted efforts of our new priest, Rev. Philip Stonhouse and our new music director, Tyler Versluis, with technical assistance from Colin Hall and Mary Anne Perta, Rev. Philip's wife, provided weekly support in our Sunday online worship through inspiring music and reassuring Gospel reflections. In September they produced three online Choral Evensongs with exceptional inspirational music. For the Christmas season, Tyler assembled a group of gifted musicians to create taped and live performances for a traditional Lessons and Carols service as well as our Christmas Eve and Christmas Day services. Finally, Tyler and Erika Sitko, his wife, hosted a Zoom Carol Sing the week after Christmas that enabled both participants and listeners to, like Scrooge, "honour Christmas" in our hearts and look to the new year with hope. Philip's and Tyler's combined ministries created a Christmas joy to dispel the darkness and despair inflicted by the pandemic.




World Day of Prayer: Vanuatu

Country: Vanuatu (VAH-noo-AHA-too) "Build on a Strong Foundation"



The service this year was written by the Christian women of the Republic of Vanuatu, World Day of Prayer Committee.

Vanuatu is a small country of islands located in the South Pacific Ocean. The black and white sandy beaches, coral reefs with coloured fish, lovely birds, and fruits and nuts in the forest all make the islands a pristine environment, even though they are vulnerable to frequent tropical storms, earthquakes, cyclones, tsunamis, and active volcanoes.

What is The World Day of Prayer?

The World Day of Prayer is a global ecumenical movement which brings Christians of many traditions together to observe a common day of prayer each year. Through preparation and participation in the worship service, we can learn how our sisters of other countries, languages and cultures understand the Biblical passages in their context.

Each year, a different host country prepares the content, highlighting its culture and regional justice issues. For 2021, the country is Vanuatu.

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The Redress of God's Word

Not too long ago, I was taking a walk down Spadina Avenue with a non-Christian friend of mine, who mentioned how confusing it is for a Christian to live and abide by the laws and customs of two different kingdoms: the world's, and God's. In Canada we are blessed to say that many of the customs and laws of our country work in harmony with the laws of God's kingdom, but it is not hard to find areas where contradictions lie. For example, in the year 2021 it is considered a practicality and almost a necessity to live with your boyfriend or girlfriend before marriage. But under the laws of God's kingdom this practicality is revealed for what it actually is: sin disguised as conventionality. Recently I was shocked to find out that one of the largest and most popular pornographic host sites on the internet is actually headquartered in Canada. The ubiquity of pornography – which warps and destroys the sensibilities of people – is another example of how the kingdom of the world paves over sin and ignores the massacre it leaves behind.

I am currently reading *The Redress of Poetry*, a series of poetry lectures by Irish poet Seamus Heaney, gifted to me before Christmas by Mr. Bruce Gleeson. In the opening lecture, Heaney discusses how poetry is useful and even essential to us, as it makes the world a richer and more complicated place. It "balances" out a world that is obsessed with making everything quicker, easier and cheaper. Just as poetry brings **redress** to the world – **a restoration**, **a rectification** – God's Word functions in the same way, by acting as a **counterbalance** to the ways of the world. In this broken place we can at least hope for a blissful equilibrium, where the will of God and Man hang in balance through the establishment of the Church.

In the same way that poetry complicates the world we live in, God's presence complicates our lives. "Why believe in something, when it's simply easier to not believe in it?", the world demands of us. Why subscribe to doctrines and concepts that potentially alienate me from atheist, Muslim and Buddhist friends? Why bind myself to another world whose laws and customs demand that I act in transgression to the world's natural order?

I cannot answer these questions succinctly, but we know that our task is not easy, as Christ tells us. Even if you were born in the Church, the act of balancing the demands of the world and God do not get easier. In this day and age, the Devil rarely attacks openly, and instead sneaks in through the cracks of our apathy and lukewarmness, when sin simply becomes a cardinal normality.

Here are the opening lines of *Love III "Love Bade Me Welcome"*, by Anglican poet George Herbert:

Love bade me welcome: yet my soul drew back, Guiltie of dust and sinne.

In 1911 the composer Ralph Vaughan Williams set the poems of George Herbert to music, his "Five Mystical Songs", which includes Love Bade Me Welcome. I first heard this song during communion at a chapel in Grand Rapids, and it opened my eyes to what communion means. In the same way that God's Word must bring balance to the whole world – the external – God must bring balance to our own hearts – an internal balance. We cannot change the sinful nature of the world and of ourselves, but we can be redressed with God's medicine.

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Adult Discipleship and Growing in Faith Together (GIFT)

Surprised by Hope

One of the first projects Christine Ivy, newly hired Youth and Discipleship Associate Pastor, had the privilege of working on at St. Matthew's was the *Surprised by Hope* GIFT Group series with Rev. Philip and Dawn Mercer. Christine was pleasantly surprised by the relevance of this study to our current situation with COVID.

Behind the scenes preparation required a thorough editing of the study guide to create a shorter, clearer, COVID-relevant program focused on the St. Matthew's community and suitable to experience on Zoom. A survey (DoodlePoll) was taken to determine the most popular times people were available in order to offer multiple evening (or morning) sessions, as needed.

As the start date approached, the province progressively tightened its COVID regulations. Ultimately, in-person gatherings were not permitted, including Wednesday Eucharist and the popular GIFT session afterwards. When the studies got underway, there were three groups, Monday evening with David and Kathie Oakden as leaders, Tuesday evening with Deborah Hurn, Nancy Hurn and Dawn Mercer as leaders, and Thursday evening with Ann Sim and Rev. Merv as leaders. The discussions were relevant, engaging, and practical, and the videos with N.T. Wright were easy to follow.

At the end of the study, a survey was taken of the participants. One discovery was that the concept of heaven – not just as a pie-in-the-sky vision for some later time, but as something we help bring about here, in our lives today – was a common theme of our learning. We are a "resurrection people," as Wright said, and we are building that "kingdom of heaven" here on earth ('as it is in heaven' as mentioned in the Lord's Prayer). People enjoyed talking through new ideas with old and new friends, deepening relationships, and feeling free to contribute to the discussion or simply listen.

This feedback is important to the planning of future GIFT Groups and online learning. There were eleven respondents to the survey, whose comments are informing the planning for future adult faith learning opportunities such as the three-week *How to Read the Bible* GIFT course that began February 1.

Advent Devotional Calendars

In December, Advent Devotional Calendars were put into the hands of as many parishioners as possible. This kind of material has in the past been distributed after services but due to COVID restrictions Christine Ivy, our recently hired Youth and Discipleship Associate Pastor, hand-delivered some booklets and mailed others to people who had signed up for a GIFT Group, even if they became unable to attend. For Christine, being able to visit a few people, physically-distanced at their doorstep, became one of the highlights of her Advent season. The visits gave her more clues about how wonderful the congregation of St. Matthew's is, even when we cannot congregate. If you were unable to receive and read the Devotional Advent Calendar, perhaps you were able to watch the devotional videos which she posted on YouTube, where she read passages from the booklet each day in Advent. This was another opportunity to experience unity in the Holy Spirit who keeps us together... even while apart.

Advent Messy Church

Continuing online via Zoom, our Messy Church in November 2020 saw a session packed full of crafts and activities introducing and preparing families for Advent.

As usual, families received packages delivered ahead of the event containing all the materials. The activities ranged from mission-focused projects of creating cards and treats for isolated and less fortunate folks, to introducing Advent devotionals of a Scriptural chain garland and a gingerbread Nativity scene.

One particularly fun activity was a telling of the Christmas story led by Reverend Philip, with the children seeking out characters from the story around their house, as a kind of 'scavenger hunt' as we went along. These characters had been sent to parents in the package to be hidden around the house. It was a great co-operative and innovative effort that got the children moving and involved in the telling of the story.

Following the activities and crafts, we enjoyed a lovely time of worship and singing together, led by Reverend Philip and with special thanks to Bruce Millerd (Liam's Dad / Rev. Merv & Dawn Mercer's son-in-law) for providing us with musical



accompaniment on guitar. Finally, we wrapped up the evening with star cookies and hot chocolate together. It was a wonderful start together for the special season of Advent.

That's it from our household. We wish you all plenty of health, please stay safe until we see each other again, soon we hope.



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Bill Pierce – A Founding Member of St. Matthew's

"Bill and Madeline were founding members of St Matthew's Anglican Church in Islington where Bill served as a Warden."

This statement caught the attention of several parishioners reading the article entitled:

"Bill Pierce was the teacher that every student wants, the volunteer every community needs and the loving father that every child deserves." *Toronto Star*, January 10, 2021 (link is below)

The page-filling tribute describes Bill's noteworthy career as a high school science teacher who became the science coordinator for the Etobicoke Board of Education where he developed the innovative science kit for elementary teachers. Bill was 99. The Star relates that "in 1992, when his son Stephen was diagnosed with terminal cancer, Bill sat by his hospital bed, chatting with him about religion while his son was awake and watching him sleep when he wasn't. ... For many years he organized the Terry Fox Run in Etobicoke," ... devoting it so much time that he met Terry's parents. He carved shore birds, duck decoys and walking sticks.

Who was he? Do you remember them? Verna Wilkinson & Mary Wallace remember them, and that he left St. Matthew's after Madeline died.

Verna remembers a surprising phone call. She was busy with her new baby in her new home on Sara Lou Court. The unknown caller asked if her son (4-year-old Gordon) and little black dog were in the caller's back yard! Verna says the Pierces were members of the Couples' Club at St. Matthew's and that Madeline and Jean Good were very involved in the DCA, Downtown Church Workers. The Pierces dedicated an offering plate to St. Matthew's. The parish Photo Directory included their photo in 1988 but they were absent by 1992.
