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

From the Rector



Recently I attended our Area Clergy Retreat in Niagara Falls. It was a deeply enriching time, in no small part due to our excellent retreat director. He taught us that we minister out of our baptisms, we are Easter people, and we are called to discern together how God is leading us into ministry and mission. As our parish is in the midst of launching its strategic plan, I found it to be a very timely subject!

Spiritual discernment is about recognizing what leads us away from God and noting that which draw us deeper into God's love, peace, and joy. In order to choose the pathways that lead us towards God, we must first practice giving thanks for the times and ways we've experienced God's grace in the past. This spiritual tradition teaches that it is only out of a deep gratitude for God's goodness that we can be free to make wise and fruitful decisions moving forward.

Cultivating a disposition of gratitude can inoculate us from cynicism, a critical spirit, and hopelessness. It has always been so. The Ancient People of God were led out of bondage in Egypt, but they struggled to find the way to their new home. Along the way God gave them the Torah, a kind of manifesto that taught them a unique way of life. A key component from this manual: the offering of sacrifices of thanksgiving. The Ancient sacrificial system (the offering of 'first-fruits' for example) wasn't about appeasing a hungry or vengeful God, it was about providing opportunity for God's people to generously offer thanks to God. It grounded the people in God's faithfulness and forced them to remember that all they have comes from God. "Remember the Lord your God, for it is he who gives you power to get wealth, so that he may confirm his covenant that he swore to your ancestors, as he is doing today." (Deut 8:18)

In many ways, I found our 70th celebrations last year an exercise in giving thanks. We took time to remember the many and varied ways God has been faithful to this parish. This act of remembering was essential before we were to begin our strategic planning process. In order to face the challenges ahead of us, we needed to have our faith renewed in the God who was with us in the past, and who promises to always be with us. "I will be with you, even to the end of the age." (Matt 28:20)

Harvest Thanksgiving can remind us of the need to continue to practice giving thanks. It comes at an important time for us this year as we read and digest the strategic plan and discern how each of us is to get involved in its implementation. We must all recall how God has shown us God's persistent and life-changing love if we are to respond faithfully to the call to follow Christ in ministry and mission. This Thanksgiving, let us be renewed in the practice of giving thanks that perceives God at work in our lives. Let us offer ourselves as living sacrifices of praise and thanksgiving, partnering in Christ's mission and ministry. And in response to God's goodness, let us truly and enthusiastically utter these words in our worship and at home:

Thanks be to God!

Welcome Back!

We do hope that everyone has had a good summer and that you were able to enjoy the many warm sunny days. The hot weather hopefully has provided you with positive energy for what lies ahead as it certainly looks like a busy fall.

Going back to the summer, a number of positive changes occurred in the parish facilities. These included painting the office entrance inside and outside as well as the entrance by the west doors to the gym. We hope these physical changes have made the church more inviting and welcoming. As well, changes included updating the church website to be current with the activities in the life at St. Matthew's.

Fall plans include the following:

Saint Matthew's Sunday was held on September 22. Following the 10:00 a.m. service, a parish lunch was served in the gym. Ministries that were highlighted included Prayer Shawls, Indigenous Ministry and our Photo Archives.

The Alpha program, which will be led by our area Bishop Jenny, began on Wednesday, September 25. The course will run for a period of 9 weeks and will include dinner served at 6:00 pm with the evening concluding at 8:15 pm. The program has the dual purpose of helping you on your spiritual journey as well as deepening and broadening your faith in Christ.

The Strategic Plan, in the development of which a number of parishioners have participated, was adopted at a Special Vestry Meeting held on Sunday, October 6. This Plan is based on the 3 "B's" – Belonging, Believing, Behaving. The Plan will guide the direction of the Church over the next three years. We encourage everyone to read the document and provide feedback. It's available online through the weekly email, and paper copies are in the Narthex. See page 9 for information about the upcoming Town Hall Meeting on October 20 at 4:00 p.m.

The Digital Sign team under the leadership of Marguerite Locke has provided a recommendation to the Wardens. The recommendation has been approved by the Wardens and is conditional on financing. This new sign will help market the various activities and ministries at Saint Matthew's.

Change!

I'm writing this reflection in a lovely, ocean-side cottage overlooking the Bay of Fundy on the island of Grand Manan, New Brunswick. For Dawn and myself, this is a return to somewhere we vacationed with our girls in a summer that now seems a very long time ago. And, it's not the same anymore! Sure, it's recognizable but it's also very different from what we remember.

We've arrived here after the busy summer season, to be sure, but many things are not the same as we expected or wanted them to be, too. For instance, the great North Head bakery has just moved to "winter hours" this week - Thursday to Saturday only. For us that's just damned inconvenient! That's just one example of the ways change can prove to be an irritant. Of course, some change is for the better; the seedy grocery store of my memory is now a new supermarket with space and lots of choice. But McLauchlin's Wharf, a fondly remembered restaurant in Seal Cove, is closed and for sale. Most other restaurants seem to be either shut or on severely reduced schedules.

And so I go back and forth between frustration, even sadness, at the differences while still breathing in the ongoing reality of the Bay's tides which have continued their natural rhythms, even while change continues on the shore and in people's lives.

As I think about it, I'm reminded of our life together at St. Matt's and the way some changes have caused irritation, at the same time as recognizing the constants we celebrate. Old friends have left us but others have joined us. Sunday worship styles have shifted and that can be irritating to some while celebrated by others.

If we're brave we can face the difference around us and seek the constant that can reassure us. The tides continue their unending cycles the way God remains a constant for us even as the community of faith changes.

Change is inevitable in life and we must each choose how we respond to it. My prayer is that we see it as an opportunity to find God and God's love in the midst of change; that is the constant we must learn to see even as we change as a community. In all of its elemental purity, Grand Manan is still marvelous after all; it is just the same as God's reign in our hearts in St. Matthew's community of faith.

Sign Project 2019

As some of you may be aware from emails to the Parish in September, we are undertaking a modernization of the existing outdoor sign on the front east side of the church property. The purpose of this "improvement" is threefold.

We expect that a modern look will be more inviting or appealing to people to come in and check out what is happening at our Church.

We hope to engage more effectively with the many commuters who travel past St. Matthew's every day as well as with the folks just walking by our door.

Finally, we hope to share many important notices including service times, Messy Church dates, special guests to the Parish, celebrations and other events that currently cannot be advertised well on the old sign due to space and letter shortages.

The existing sign will be retrofitted to enable LED or digital messaging on the centre panel and will also have an upgrade on the top panel in our blue logo. The "Sign Team" secured quotations from various contractors in the GTA and has recommended Greentak Electronics of Mississauga to the Warden/Clergy team, who have given their approval. For reference, Greentak undertook a spring upgrade to the signage of All Saints Kingsway Anglican Church, Timothy Eaton Memorial Church on St. Clair Ave West, and are in the process of doing a new sign for Kingsway Lambton United Church amongst many other clients.

It is necessary for our budget of \$15,000 to be funded prior to signing the contract. Once funding is in place and our team is advised by the Wardens, we will obtain a permit from the City of Toronto, sign the contract and provide a deposit. The work will hopefully be completed this fall subject to our success with funding.

Many parishioners have indicated an interest in donating to this project and as of publication, we have received generous gifts representing almost 50% of our target. Thank you! If you feel that you would like to make a gift in this regard, please provide funds with the designation "Sign Project" so that the Wardens are aware of your intent. Thank you in advance for any contribution to this project. The Parish will be kept up-to-date on our progress via email and announcements at Church.

Food Cupboard

During the past year, donations to and requests from the food cupboard have been significantly lower than in 2018. We thank all those who support this ministry, including members of the parish and the Kingsley school. So far this year 126 items have been donated. No one who requests food is turned away.

Have you ever wondered what goes into the bags we prepare? Below is a list of items we suggest to stock the cupboard. These are items that have long expiry dates, and can feed people nutritiously for a reasonable amount of time. And it's always nice to include something special like a box of cookies.

While we indicate that people are to come only once each month, every once in a while there are situations where, at the discretion of the secretary or clergy, an alternate supply bag can be given when someone comes for a second time in the same month.

We are always ready to welcome new members. Generally, the time required at most would be one weekend per month—less if we have more participants. We set up on Saturday morning, and tidy up on Sunday after the 10:00 service. We have both men and women members, and we look forward to welcoming new ones to this ministry.

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


