From the Pastor

Rev. Philip Stonhouse

Hello to my St. Matt's Family,

"Because of the Lord's great love we are not consumed, for his compassions never fail. They are new every morning; great is your faithfulness. I say to myself, 'The Lord is my portion; therefore I will wait for him.'" Lamentations 3:22-24

As the second Easter of COVID-19 has come and gone, I have little doubt that people were praying for a restored life, a new life, because...well, we need it. The resurrection of Christ was an utterly new hope which defeated death and suffering – the worst enemies we have ever known. Yet, so often we can feel defeated by bad news: by the suffering, by the conflict and by the hurt that weighs on the world. Why? Why can all of this pull us down, when we know about a greater hope?

This is an important question we should all ask ourselves. I think there are many reasons, but for myself, my narrative is still too wrapped up with the way of the world. I hear bad news and I empathize; I take it as news about myself and the world. But God's news is wholly different. It is good news. It tells us that these are fleeting days which will be redeemed into an even greater life than the one we know now. Just like the suffering of Job, our life can be awful and a struggle, but God's graciousness and love are greater than our suffering. There are studies that tell us that bad news is bad for us, so let's keep reaching for the Good News of Jesus.

Another reason is that I still struggle with making my relationship with God my primary relationship, and I still struggle with taking time for Him above everything else. Nothing outside of our own hearts can isolate us from God. Today, even when we are alone, there is so much to do, there are so many distractions, and it is all too easy to just fall into another book or TV show or whatever else. Yet God is offering us unending intimacy, closeness and love – a love that far exceeds the hurt. We all know we need love, belonging, closeness, so why don't we rest in God?

I think another reason is that we can easily lose joy in the little things. A funny study says that we all have a coping mechanism by which we become less excited with familiar things, which we might have loved, so that we might see new things. Similarly, forgetting can be purposeful for

future remembering. Yet I believe when we first encounter something, the reason we find such joy there is because we can see such possibility, hope, joy and life in it. In short, I believe we find excitement in new things because we get glimmers of a life with God. The problem is that as time goes on we don't live into that relationship, we don't allow God's hope to live through it, we don't look for His blessing through these things and so those things become far less interesting. We don't really need anything new, we just need God in the things we have.

As we experience further lockdown as a church, we are not giving up, we are still working, rejoicing, learning, growing and reaching out with the love of Christ. Nothing will stop this work. A big thank you to everyone who has taken part in the Soup's On ministry that brought warm meals weekly to people in need. Thank you to all those who have been helping one another get vaccines and continuing to have phone conversations with all those in need. Thank you to all those taking part in anti-racism conversations, learning groups, Messy Church and so much more. This is a living community of Christ, even if we are distanced, and I am very thankful. Stay tuned for more learning and fellowship events. They are in the works.

I pray that you might know God's presence and experience all the good gifts that come from Him alone.



Please join us on Wednesday, May 26 by Zoom at 7:30 p.m. for an informative discussion and celebration of the ministries by TUNM and St. Matthew's. Our guest speakers will be The Rev. Leigh Kern, Right Relations Coordinator and Zachary Grant, Community Director of Holy Trinity.

St. Matthew's has been an active partner with TUNM since 2015. TUNM was established as an ecumenical ministry in 1996 to serve indigenous people in the GTA through the assistance of the United Church of Canada and The Toronto Anglican Diocese. Assistance and programs are provided to both indigenous and non-indigenous individuals with a focus on reconciliation.



Our evening will identify the outreach ministries offered by TUNM, celebrate the work of our "Soup's On" ministry as organized by Nancy Hurn and Deborah Hurn and also learn about future outreach initiatives in which St. Matthew's might participate. Rev. Philip will moderate the discussion and there will be time for questions within our hour-long event.

Introducing our new Deputy Warden, Marguerite Locke

In the organizational structure of the Anglican Church, the Clergy and Wardens are the "leaders" of the Parish. Cast in supporting roles are deputy wardens who try to assist the lead wardens and Priest in the best way they can to serve the needs of the parish. I have the honour of serving as Deputy People's Warden for St. Matthew's in 2021 and hope that I can contribute in a meaningful way to the life and needs of our church.



By way of a little background, I was born in Montreal and then moved to Toronto as a toddler, where my family lived in Swansea and then Etobicoke. After attending Victoria College at U of T and doing some lengthy backpacking trips through Europe, I commenced a career in the insurance industry. Our older daughter, Jackie, worked for several years teaching English in Bolivia and met her husband, Israel, in Cochabamba. They were married here at St. Matthew's in 2010 and our younger daughter Diana and her husband, Joe, were married at the church in 2012. We are now blessed with four busy grandsons! We enjoy spending time with the family at our cottage, golfing, skiing, and participating in the Swansea Community Band. Anti-Racism Discussion and Planning

Working Group on Inclusion

Background on the anti-racism motion

As part of this year's Vestry meeting, parishes were asked by the Bishop's Committee on Intercultural Ministry, with the full support of the Social Justice & Advocacy Committee, to present a Social Justice motion committing ourselves to anti-racism.

The background provided on the motion was very thoughtful and can be reviewed in its entirety on the diocesan website (<u>linked here for those reading online</u>). The first paragraph of the background reads as follows:

The vision of God's Kingdom is one where all races, tribes and nations are welcomed and made one in Christ Jesus (*Galatians 3:28*), where barriers are broken down and all are full citizens of the household of God (*Ephesians 2:17-21*) and where all are invited to contribute the gifts and glory of their heritage (*Revelation 21:26*). Yet, as racialized members of our communities can attest, and as has been made painfully visible in the events of this past year, our society and even our Church fall far short of this goal.

In response, St. Matthew's worked to develop our motion, subsequently approved at Vestry, which states:

The parish of St. Matthew's acknowledges that Anti-Black racism exists in our society and in our Church, and that it and all forms of racism against Black, Indigenous and other racialized people are a sin against God and against our neighbour. We commit ourselves to the recognition, dismantling, and elimination of Anti-Black and other forms of racism in our secular institutions, in our Church, and in ourselves, and to work for the full inclusion, participation and belongingness of Black, Indigenous and other racialized people in all sectors of our common life.

In light of this acknowledgment, and in keeping with this commitment, our parish undertakes to take tangible steps to understand and acknowledge our own biases in terms of race and ethnicity, whether known or unknown and then to create opportunities for and engage in education about the realities of racism in this world, country, and city (through speakers, BIPOC leaders, book studies, sharing stories, etc.). We seek to oppose any kind of racism towards our brothers and sisters, whether black, indigenous or people of colour (BIPOC). We will move to embrace fully all cultures and peoples in our habits, music, pews, and leadership. We will continue our focus on indigenous outreach, but with a view that racism is something inherent in all of us and that affects everyone. This cannot all be done at once, but our hope is to create structures and groups that will facilitate this work on an ongoing basis. We recognize moving forward that opposing racism is not the work of one day or one study, but rather the work of many lifetimes and so it is our ongoing commitment to undergo this work of partnership, embrace and Godly love.

Response from the St. Matthew's family and the work to date

The level of interest that has been demonstrated within the St. Matthew's community in discussing anti-racism and how we might move forward has been phenomenal.

Anti-Racism Discussion and Planning (continued)

This can be a difficult and sensitive topic but one that our community has already committed to addressing despite the discomforts that may arise. We will strive to get comfortable with having difficult conversations, practicing grace, and continuing to show mutual respect and forgiveness as we all seek to recognize, dismantle, and eliminate racism within ourselves and within our communities.

We have a team of people who have volunteered to help us define a path forward. The committee is now called the *Working Group on Inclusion*, and drawing from the parish motion, it has identified the initial key focus of work to be on anti-racism issues and the full inclusion, participation, and valuing of every human being within the community. To date, the group has met twice to start building a direction and plan, and has also gathered information and provided input to inform first steps. An initial resources list (books and online resources related to racism and anti-racism) has been started so that any in the parish family who wish can immediately proceed to familiarize themselves with this issue. The list will be expanded as the work continues, and all are welcome to provide suggestions!

Next steps!

Everyone in the parish is invited and welcome to join in the work going forward. Regular updates will now be posted and upcoming plans, events and programs will be shared as confirmed (in the weekly email as pertinent, and longer updates in each issue of Matt's Media). There are some initial plans in development for June/early summer – stay tuned for more information!

Messy Church continues on Zoom. Since school for most kids is on Zoom, we are challenged to create a special time together (and not just another school lesson) in which the children learn more about God and themselves in a fun and active way. During all the lockdowns we want our children to know that they are special to God and that their friend Jesus is with them and loves them "more than they can imagine."

In February, Messy Church looked at 'Power and Energy' as our theme. Beginning with a little bit of joyful surprise, the kids discovered the power in 'Pop Rocks' style candy. The activities explored different kinds of power and what it shows about the activity of God and the Holy Spirit in our lives. Building a butterfly with tissue paper wings, we saw the effects of static electricity on a balloon making the wings flap. There was lots of excitement in racing a balloon-powered toy car and seeing what makes it go further. The kids also enjoyed a game of "Bring Ye Forth," finding various items around the house related to power and energy. For our food segment, we cooked some simple cheese and crackers in the oven and talked about food as power for our bodies. God's power in the world and in our lives was apparent to everyone.

With March's session of Messy Church falling just before Holy Week, we focused on 'Easter and Transformation' as our theme. Activities included building a model of the life cycle of a butterfly and relating it to the Biblical themes of transformation and resurrection, building a miniature wood plaque with 'JESUS' on it using letters found in plastic Easter eggs around the house in a quick scavenger hunt, and planting beans in small pots of soil. The food portion got extra messy when we made Irish Soda Bread and the kids had great fun kneading the dough with their hands and seeing how much bigger it was after baking. Making soda bread has been an activity that continues in some families. God's activity in our lives to help us get through the hard days of COVID was clear for the children to relate to.

Finally, April's theme focused on Jesus as the 'Light of the World', with activities and lessons focused on light. The children enjoyed receiving small glow-in-the-dark stars and putting sticky tape on them to place somewhere they can see them and remind them that God's light gives power to our lives to share with others. Everyone had fun drawing their own 'stained glass window' on clear plastic. These colourful and creative designs helped illustrate the beauty of God's light shining through us. Another fun craft was building a cardboard Light Box with holes punched in its side to create 'stars' that shine when a flashlight is shone into the box. Finally, trying something new, we broke into two groups using a breakout room in Zoom to allow for activities based on age. The younger children explored identifying items in a bag without being able to see them.

Meanwhile the older children were challenged by using Morse Code to send and receive words, relating this communication to Jesus as the light of the world and as God's message of love to us.

Every session ends with a time of worship led by Reverend Philip, with singing and pulling together the lessons of the day's theme. We continue to be grateful to Bruce Millerd, Liam's dad, for providing musical accompaniment on guitar, as well as all the volunteers who help with planning and leading activities and delivering materials packages to participants.

Soup's On Update

When we were approached last year by Toronto Urban Native Ministries (TUNM) about making a pot of soup, it seemed like a reasonable request. On further investigation, they needed soup for 200 people. Now that needed an excessively big pot! There was a need that week, and an ongoing need while COVID was impacting the community. We felt a calling to support those in need of food just as Jesus has taught us, "Whatever you do for your brothers and sisters, you do for me."

To no one's surprise, St. Matthew's Parish family and friends stepped up in more ways than we could ask or imagine. For the next year, every Tuesday, a meal was made in the gym kitchen. The numbers have varied between 100-200 meals provided per week. The menus were planned, the volunteers assigned, and the shopping was done! The Parishioners not only supported the program with their time but also the financial requirements. On average, it was \$100 per week to provide the meal. We started out filling the need by making soup, then moved to casseroles, and now more side dishes to complement their menu.

After discussion with several people, grants available for summer student opportunities at Holy Trinity, and prayerful consideration, we will stop the weekly meals as of the Victoria Day weekend. Our support of their Ministry will continue in other ways, just not a weekly meal. We will keep the Parish informed of the ongoing opportunities as they become available. Financial needs will always (unfortunately) be high on their requirements. Donations may be made directly to the program at Toronto kitchen provides fresh meals for homeless in the city – Holy Trinity, tunm.ca, or through St. Matthew's indicating the direction of funds to Outreach. All will issue tax receipts for financial donations.

We would like to thank everyone who gave of their time, their talents, and their treasures! It was a great way to experience the ongoing fellowship of St. Matts. Even though COVID kept us apart in so many ways, it gave many people a chance to get to know others as we worked to slice, dice, chop, sauté, and stir! We don't want to stop these new-found opportunities so keep an eye open for new endeavours to support those in need while maintaining COVID safety measures.

Soup's On Recipe: Chicken Salsa

Ingredients:

1 lb boneless, skinless chicken breast, cubed

1 tbsp olive oil

1 ½ cups sliced fresh mushrooms

1 cup salsa

2 cups chicken broth

1 tsp pepper

1 cup uncooked brown rice

3/4 cup cheddar cheese, shredded

Instructions:

Cube chicken, then brown in oil over medium heat until golden. Stir in mushrooms, salsa, pepper, rice (uncooked) and chicken broth. Cover tightly, and simmer on low to medium low heat for about an hour. Check after 30 minutes,; stir and add more broth as needed. Once rice is cooked and liquid absorbed, top with shredded cheddar. Remove from heat and let stand until cheese is melted. Top each serving with a dollop of sour cream if desired.

Notes: You can skip the mushrooms. You can also add chopped onions, peppers, etc. – whatever suits your taste.

Although this is a fairly entry-level Lenten fast, it was certainly challenging enough as I passed food shops on Bloor Street and watched my kids dig into their breakfasts each morning. It was a sober reminder of the weakness of the body, and how often these urges derail us in our practices of faith.

To quote a friend, "If you want to know that the devil is real, simply fast for Lent and realize how often you'll daydream about cheeseburgers."

Several of St. Matthew's youth maintained the story line as narrators. Many thanks for that important role.



Adult Learning Opportunities/ Discipleship

Several different types of learning and discipleship events were offered during the winter months:

How to Read the Bible Course

Based on the non-denominational "Bible Project," the course was an overview of the Bible with an introduction to the various types of literature and the main themes seen throughout. It provided a framework on which to locate the wide-ranging scripture readings in the Anglican lectionary that we encounter through the church year. The first two "classes" were instructional videos from the Bible Project Collection and the third used a Bible Project video from which we applied learnings from previous weeks.

Small Group Studies and GIFT Groups

A. Lord's Prayer

Following from the sermon series on the Lord's Prayer, a series of small group/GIFT studies was offered for four weeks in March – Mondays, and Tuesdays – beginning March 1 to the week of March 22.

The series began with a focus on God as our loving heavenly father and included the challenge of thinking about how far beyond our human love that God loves and cares for us. Discussions included the implications of when we say "your kingdom come"; "as we forgive others"; and that the "power and the glory" are God's. None of us will ever say the Lord's Prayer the same way as before!

One of the goals of the study series was to expand our ideas of types of prayer. Some resources for exploring different approaches to prayer were assembled and are available on <u>YouTube</u>.

B. Tuesday GIFT group

The Tuesday GIFT group is ongoing between special study sessions (such as the Lord's Prayer study). During COVID it has been a special time of contact and sustained support for all participants. People join and stay involved for whatever time period suits their needs. We have shared requests and have seen God's amazing activity in meeting those needs over the past months as we reflected on the Sunday texts.

C. Special Study Group: Alpha Marriage Course

On Thursday evenings from February 11 to March 25, several couples participated in the Alpha Marriage Course led by Rev. Philip (with Mary Anne). Each session was a 'date night,' complete with snack and beverage in a comfortable, candle-lit spot. After a group chat of preliminary self-introduction and conversation sparked by an icebreaker, e.g., 'Where would you like to travel when COVID is past?' each couple's audio was muted, and conversation was private with one's partner. Following the familiar Alpha format, video segments alternated with private discussion exercises. Each week's program suggested a mid-week 'homework' focus. "I found the program quite enjoyable and informative. I now appreciate the value of 'restating what was said' and 'expressing what I feel' in decision-making." (Kathie Oakden)


Parish Council Meeting




